## Session 1. “Effective Communication Skills”

## Session 2. “Writing Center SI Facilitated by Peer and Professional Leaders” **Room: QD 24**

**Round Table**

Our Writing Center offers Supplemental Instruction through a model similar to UMKC’s. Two small exceptions to that model are that peer consultants do not always come from a specific instructor’s course and availability for sessions in the writing center provides an infrastructure which lets students book appointments with their own SI Leader or others, substituting for office hours. This has worked successfully enough with our peer facilitators that the college has permanently funded what was previously provided through grants. Recently, we have offered SI in ways both innovative and appropriate for the community college. Beyond traditional peer facilitators, we have been experimenting with the use of professional staff as SI Leaders to bring expertise in reading and grammar for specific course needs. This session will provide details of how we have implemented various SI innovations, specifically for world history and ESL classes.

Outcomes: 1) Innovative strategies regarding professional staff use; 2) background in how supplemental instruction in writing differs from other disciplines

## Session 3. “Active Learning and Information Literacy”

Students have access to information at their fingertips, yet research studies indicate students feel overwhelmed locating appropriate sources for college-level assignments. While students are encouraged to conduct research using the college library, they may not have received guidance developing information literacy skills. Come learn methods and practices to better help students prepare for the many research papers they will be writing in college.

## Session 4. “Visual Promotion of SI Programs”

With the stigma some students face for seeking out or receiving supplemental instruction (SI), it is understandable for SI programs to promote themselves as supportive, engaging, and welcoming. Oftentimes, such promotions occur through visuals like posters and flyers, but it is not uncommon for these visuals to be either overly simple or bogged down with too much information that could overwhelm the reader. This presentation aims to provide strategies for SI program staff to create rhetorically effective visuals that draw more students in while creating a strong ethos for the program overall. The audience will learn about image layout, color choice and patterns, and text choice while reviewing (and possibly creating) sample posters and flyers for SI programs. Thus, attendees will ultimately build a foundation for visual promotions of their own programs.

## Session 5. “Mediating: Solving Conflict and Maintaining Professionalism” **Room: QD 128**

**Presenter:** *Shawna Hutchins-Williams, Power Study Program Coordinator at Southwestern College*

This session is intended for SI Faculty, Leaders, and training facilitators. Participants will leave knowledgeable of various techniques aimed at managing conflict while maintaining professionalism. By reviewing the different types of conflict that may arise within the body of Supplemental Instruction, the participants will discuss and develop synergetic approaches in order to act conscientiously when the need arises. 3CSN’s Habits of Mind (HoM) Project provides professional learning opportunities and resources for building students’ academic dispositions and attitudes. Numerous workshops have been held throughout the state to introduce faculty to 3CSN’s HoM framework. Momentum around the Habits of Mind Project has exploded since its inception spring, 2012. Beginning with 60 educators showing interest in the Habits at LINKS V, there are now more than **600 educators**, from at least **75 colleges**, who have participated in professional learning provided by the project. Through these activities practitioners have been challenged to develop “mindful” practices to influence students’ expectations and values and build intellectual habits of mind.

## Session 8. “Demands and Challenges of a Growing Program”

**Presenter:** Trista O’Connell, Assistant Director of Supplemental Instruction at California State University, Fullerton

The SI Program at California State University, Fullerton has grown rapidly to now employ 130 SI Leaders, providing support to over 330 course sections. With this growth came not only the positive impact of creating access to more students, but the challenge of providing the necessary support to a large team of leaders. This talk will focus on how we have been able to provide ongoing training, mentorship, and support while aiding in their development as SI Leaders, students, and mentors. The importance of creating support networks, including SI faculty liaisons and a cross-campus Implementation Team will also be discussed.

## Poster 1: SI and Humanities

This presentation will be in the specific track of Humanities. I will present a new take on the game hot potato, and the importance of SI in Anthropology. In Anthropology we concentrate on places and people from all over the world. In this activity students pass around an inflatable globe as music plays, whomever is holding the globe when the music stops picks a country, identifies it on the globe and describes an archaeological site located there and explains why it is important. Most often SI programs have more influence in the STEM fields, but it is also important to support Humanities with SI, especially Anthropology. In Anthropology we recognize the importance of acknowledging that other people have different views, and that we can learn better with these varying viewpoints, a common value in SI.

## Poster 2: Communicate Math through 3D Printed Models

Communicating math through visuals and applications has always been a significant part of exposing students to the importance of math. Even ancient Greek schools used wooden models to teach conic sections. Now, with developments in 3D printing, access to these type of teaching tools is easier than ever. My presentation's aim is to show how 3D printed models can be used to communicate math more efficiently and help students to intuitively understand higher math concepts. These models also tend to be very beautiful and interesting to look at, which may increase students' appreciation of the field. 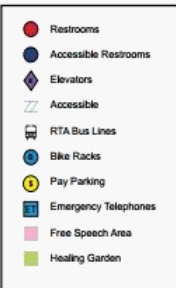
